The Star-Spangled Banner

By the thousands, they come to observe. The line snakes around the block ...moms with their children, school groups on field trips, visitors from dozens of foreign countries, veterans and active duty servicemen and women. They arrive to watch an operation in progress. The patient is the Star-Spangled Banner; the very flag that flew over Ft. McHenry in Baltimore on the morning of September 14, 1814, signaling an important turning point in the War of 1812. The British bombarded the fort for 25 hours, but finally gave up the attack. The sight of the flag waving "by the dawn's early light" inspired Francis Scott Key to write the words that would become our national anthem. The flag was loaned to the Smithsonian in 1907, and in 1912 it became a permanent gift. It

was donated by the grandson of Fort McHenry's commander, with the stipulation that it would always remain in the public's view. The original Star-Spangled Banner is among the most treasured artifacts in the collections of the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History in Washington, D.C.

In the late 1800s, the Armistead family received frequent requests for pieces of the Star-Spangled Banner. They reserved the treasured fragments for veterans, government officials, and other honored citizens. Despite efforts to limit the practice, however, over two hundred square feet of the Star-Spangled Banner were eventually given away, including one of the stars. On July 13, 1998, the 'Save America's Treasures' campaign was formally announced and with it, a highly-visible effort to save the iconic Star-Spangled Banner. Its' conservation effort became Save America's Treasures' flagship project, the goal being to support the detailed examination, treatment analysis, and preservation of the flag in a state-of-the-art glass laboratory allowing the public to observe, honoring the agreement that the flag remain in public view. Exhibit designers were faced with challenges including how best to ensure the flag's long-term preservation and explaining its' significance as an historic artifact and national symbol. After the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, a new generation of Americans is turning to this flag. Conservators may glance up from their work and see people giving them a "thumbs up" or high five them in the air; other times, visitors may place their hand over their heart and mouth the words "Thank You"; military men and women have shown respect by saluting.

QUICK FACTS ABOUT THE STAR-SPANGLED BANNER FLAG

- Made in Baltimore, Maryland, in July-August 1813 by flag maker Mary Pickersgill
- Commissioned by Major George Armistead, commander of Fort McHenry
- Original size: 30 feet by 42 feet
- Current size: 30 feet by 34 feet
- Fifteen stars (originally) and fifteen stripes

The American Legion Auxiliary emblem signifies the important principles of our American way of life and our Constitutional form of government. The emblem background is formed by the rays of the sun and represent the principles of the American Legion Auxiliary - Loyalty, Justice, Freedom, and Democracy. The rings of gold and blue each have meaning; the outer gold ring represents the rehabilitation of our sick and disabled veterans; the inside gold ring, the welfare of America's children; and the unbroken circle of blue, Unity and Loyalty. The star, emblem of service both during times of war and peace, symbolizes honor, glory and constancy. The field of white behind the star exemplifies the hope of Freedom. The words "American Legion Auxiliary" combine all the meanings to symbolize truth, remembrance, constancy, honor, service, veterans affairs and rehabilitation, children and youth, loyalty, and Americanism.

Let us not forget that to each generation comes its' patriotic duty. Upon your willingness to sacrifice and endure as those before you have sacrificed and endured, rests the hope of the nation.

Remember to fly your flag on Flag Day, June 14th, and every day.
